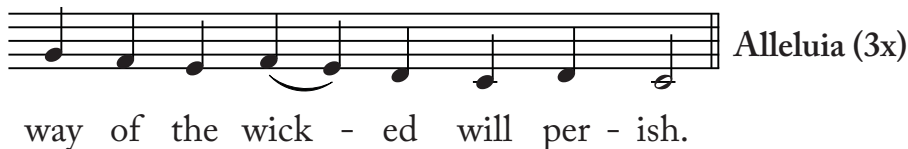
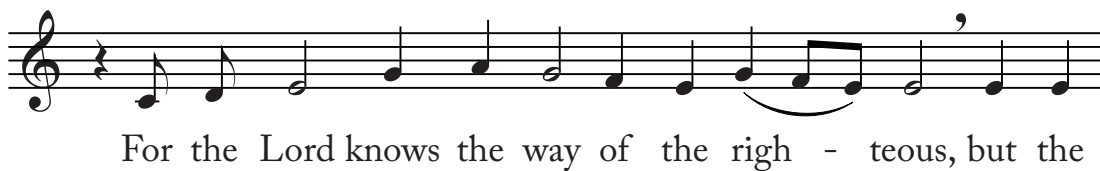
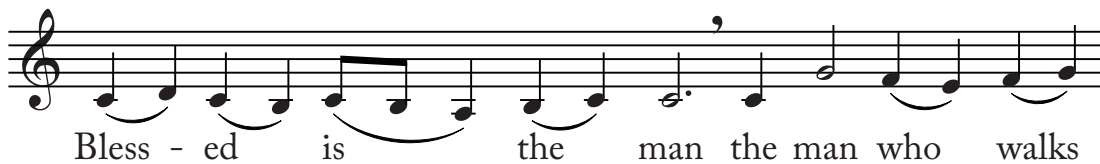

by Saint John of Damascus

The Cross and burial hast Thou endured for us, O Saviour; and, as God, Thou hast slain death by death. Wherefore, we worship Thy Resurrection on the third day. Lord, glory be to Thee.

On seeing the arising of the Creator, the apostles marvelled, crying out with angelic praise: This is the glory of the Church; this is the wealth of the Kingdom! O Thou Who didst suffer for us, Lord, glory be to Thee.

ANATOLIAN STICHERA

On certain days the following Stichera may be replaced.

Verse 7. *Let Thine ears be attentive to the voice of my supplication.*

Though Thou wast taken captive by lawless men, O Christ, yet Thou art my God, and I am not ashamed. Thou wast smitten on the back; I do not deny it. Thou wast nailed to the Cross, and I conceal it not. In Thine arising do I boast, for Thy death is my life. O omnipotent and man-befriending Lord, glory be to Thee.

Verse 6. *If Thou shouldest mark iniquities, O Lord, O Lord, who shall stand? For with Thee there is forgiveness.*

In fulfillment of David's prophecy, in Sion Christ unveiled His majesty to His disciples, revealing Himself as the One Who is praised and ever glorified with the Father and the Holy Spirit; once, being without flesh as the Word, but now for us becoming incarnate, being put to death as man, and arising according to His power, as the Friend of man.

Verse 5. *For Thy Name's sake have I patiently waited for Thee, O Lord; my soul hath waited patiently for Thy word, my soul hath hoped in the Lord.*

Thou didst descend into Hades, O Christ, as Thou didst will. Thou didst despoil death since Thou art God and Master; and Thou didst rise on the third day, and from the bonds of Hades and corruption didst Thou also raise up Adam, who cried out and said: Glory to Thy Resurrection, O only Friend of man.

Verse 4. From the morning watch until night, from the morning watch let Israel hope in the Lord.

1. Prokeimenon literally translates “*What is said to be read*” but in each service it has a different meaning based on context. In Vespers it means “*That which had been stated before by the Prophets*”, referring to the faith of our fathers of the Old Covenant in the coming Savior Jesus Christ. This is made evident by placing it after hymn “O Gladsome Light”, a hymn announcing the Light entering the world casting away all darkness.





Theotokion

Both, now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

We chant the Resurrectional Theotokion in the mode of the preceding Apolytikion. On Feasts of the Lord & the Theotokos the Theotokion is replaced by the Festal Troparion. The Resurrectional Theotokia can be found on pages 35-36.

DEACON: Wisdom.

PEOPLE: Father, bless

PRIEST: Christ our God, the Existing One, is blessed, always, now and ever, and unto ages of ages.

PEOPLE: Amen. Preserve, O God, the holy Orthodox faith, and all Orthodox Christians, unto ages of ages. Amen

PRIEST: Most holy Theotokos, save us.

PEOPLE: More honorable than the Cherubim, and more glorious beyond compare than the Seraphim, thou who without corruption bearest God the Word and art truly Theotokos: we magnify thee.

PRIEST: Glory to Thee, O Christ our God and our hope, glory to Thee.

PEOPLE: Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; both now and ever, and unto ages of ages. Amen. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy. Father, bless.

THE GREAT DISMISSAL

PRIEST: May [*insert the appointed characteristic phrase*], Christ our true God, through the intercessions of his all-immaculate and all-blameless holy Mother; by the might of the precious and life-giving cross; by the protection of the honorable bodiless powers of heaven; at the supplication of the honorable, glorious Prophet, Forerunner and Baptist John; of the holy, glorious and all-laudable apostles; of the holy glorious and right-victorious martyrs; of our venerable and God-bearing fathers; of N. [*patron saint of the church*]; of the holy and righteous ancestors of God, Joachim and Anna; of N. [*the saint of the day*], whose memory we celebrate, and of all the saints: have mercy on us, and save us, forasmuch as he is good and loveth mankind.

Through the prayers of our holy fathers, Lord Jesus Christ our God, have mercy upon us and save us.

PEOPLE: Amen.

THE APOSTICHA THEOTOKIA

Theotokion. Mode 1

Behold, fulfilled is the prophecy of Isaiah: For as a virgin hast thou given birth, and after giving birth, thou hast remained as thou wast before childbirth; for He that was born was God. Wherefore also, He hath renewed all natures. But, O Mother of God, disdain not the supplications of thy servants that are offered unto thee in thy temple; but, since thou holdest the Compassionate One in thine arms, show compassion on thy servants, and intercede thou that our souls be saved.

Theotokion. Mode 2

O new wonder, surpassing all the ancient wonders! For who hath known of a mother without husband giving birth, and carrying in her arms Him that embraceth all creation? He that is born is of God's will. In that thou carriest Him in Thine arms as a babe, O all-pure one, and hast boldness towards Him as His Mother, cease not from entreating Him in behalf of them that honour thee, that He have pity and save our souls.

Theotokion. Mode 3

Seedlessly and of the Divine Spirit, and by the will of the Father, didst thou conceive the Son of God, Who, from the Father, existed before the ages without mother. And thou hast brought forth in the flesh Him Who, for our sakes, came forth from thee without father; and thou hast suckled Him as a babe. Wherefore, cease not to intercede that our souls be delivered from perils.

Theotokion. Mode 4

Incline to the entreaty of thy suppliants, O all-blameless one. Make to cease the uprising of afflictions that come upon us, and deliver us from all manner of grief. For thee alone do we have as a secure and sure anchor, and we have thy protection. Let us not be put to shame, O Lady, as we call upon thee. Hasten at the entreaty of those who faithfully cry to thee: Rejoice, O Lady, thou help of all, thou joy and shelter and salvation of our souls.

THE APOSTICHA THEOTOKIA

Theotokion. Mode Plagal 1. / Tone 5

A temple and gate art thou, a palace and throne of the King, O all-revered Virgin, through whom my Redeemer, Christ the Lord, hath appeared to them that slept in darkness, since He is the Sun of Righteousness; for He willed to enlighten those whom He had fashioned by His own hand, according to His own image. Wherefore, O all-hymned one, since thou hast boldness toward Him as His mother, intercede thou unceasingly that our souls be saved.

Theotokion. Mode Plagal 2. / Tone 6

My Creator and Redeemer, Christ the Lord, came forth from thy womb, O all-pure one. Being en clothed with me, He freed Adam from the ancient curse. Wherefore, O all-pure one, to thee, the true Mother of God and Virgin, do we unceasingly cry out the Angel's greeting: Rejoice! Rejoice, O Lady, protection and shelter and salvation of our souls.

Theotokion. Grave Mode. / Tone 7

Fleeing for refuge under thy shelter, O Lady, all we, the earthborn, cry out to thee: O Theotokos, our hope, deliver us from our countless offences and save our souls.

Theotokion. Mode Plagal 4. / Tone 8

O unwedded Virgin, who inexpressibly conceived God in the flesh, O Mother of the Most High God: Receive the petitions of thy suppliants, O all-blameless one. O thou who grantest unto all purification from offences, receive now our entreaties, and beseech that we all be saved.

RESURRECTIONAL THEOTOKIA

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode 1

As Gabriel cried aloud unto thee, “Hail, O Virgin,” with that cry did the Lord of all become incarnate in thee, O holy ark, as spake the righteous David; and Thou wast revealed as more spacious than the heavens, in that thou bore thy Creator. Wherefore, glory to Him Who abode in thee; glory to Him Who came from thee; glory to Him, Who through thy birth-giving hath set us free.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode 2

Exceeding glorious beyond the power of thought are all thy mysteries, O Theotokos; for being sealed in purity and preserved in virginity, thou wast acknowledged to be in very truth the Mother who didst bring forth the true God. Wherefore, entreat Him to save our souls.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode 3

Thou, who art the mediatrix for the salvation of our race, we praise, O Virgin Theotokos; for in the flesh assumed from thee, after that He had suffered the passion of the Cross, thy Son and our God delivered us from corruption, because He is the Lover of mankind.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode 4

The Mystery which was hidden from everlasting and was unknown of the angels, O Theotokos, wast revealed through thee, to those who dwell upon earth. In that God, having become incarnate, in unconfused union, of His own good will accepted the Cross for our sake. Whereby He raised again the first created, and hath saved our souls from death.

RESURRECTIONAL THEOTOKIA

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode Plagal 1. / Tone 5

Rejoice, O uncrossed gate; rejoice, O wall and protection of those who hasten unto thee; rejoice, O quiet haven, who hast not known wedlock, O thou who hast given birth in the flesh to thy Creator and God. Thou shalt continue to intercede for the sake of those who praise and worship thy birthgiving.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode Plagal 2. / Tone 6

Thou Who didst call Thy Mother blessed of Thine own good will and didst come to Thy passion shining radiantly upon the Cross, desiring to recall Adam and saying unto the angels: Rejoice with me; for I have found the piece of silver which was lost. O our God, Who with wisdom hast ordered all things, glory to Thee.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Grave Mode. / Tone 7

In that thou art the treasury of our resurrection O all-praised one, lead thou forth from the pit and bottom of transgression those who set their hope in thee. For thou hast saved those who were guilty of sin, in that thou didst give birth to our Salvation; O thou who before giving birth wast virgin, and at giving birth and after giving birth wast virgin still.

Resurrectional Theotokion. Mode Plagal 4. / Tone 8

Thou Who for our sake wast born of a Virgin, and didst suffer crucifixion, O good One, and didst despoil death through death, and as God didst reveal Resurrection. Despise not those Whom Thou hast created with Thine own hand, show forth Thy love for mankind, O merciful One. Accept the intercessions of Thy mother, the Theotokos for us, and save Thy despairing people, O our Savior.
